## Mail Carrier Exam For Gilreath Office

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to fill the position of rural carrier at Gilreath, North Carolina.

The examination will be held at Wilkesboro, North Carolina. Receipt of applications will close on March 6, 1947.

The date of examination will be stated on admission cards mailed to applicants after the closing date for receipt of applications, and will be about 15 days after that date.

The salary of a rural carrier on a standard daily route of 30 miles is \$2020 a year, with an additional \$20 a mile a year for each mile or major fraction thereof in excess of 30 miles. Salaries on routes of shorter length or of less frequent service are proportionately lower. A rural carrier serving one tri-weekly route shall be paid a salary on

the basis of a route one-half the length of the route served by him. A rural carrier serving two-tri-weekly routes shall be paid a salary on the basis of a route one-half the combined length of the two routes. All rural carriers must furnish and maintain at their own expense all necessary vehicle equipment for the prompt handling of the mails, but they are allowed an equipment maintenance of 6 cents a mile on the basis of the daily mileage scheduled (this amount to \$549 per year for a 30-mile route). They are permitted to use motor vehicles, but are required to furnish sufficient equipment to handle postal business properly.

Broadcast: February 15, 1947

1 lb. link pork sausage  
2 tablespoons cold water  
2 medium, unpeeled apples  
2 tablespoons sugar

2 cups mashed sweet potatoes, cooked or canned  
1/2 cup Fat Milk  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
few grains pepper

Turn on oven; set at moderately slow (350° F.). Grease a shallow quart baking dish. Put sausage into cold skillet with water. Cover; cook slowly until water evaporates. Core apples and slice; mix with sugar. Put into greased dish. Mix together mashed potatoes, milk, salt and pepper. Put on top of apples. Top with sausage. Bake 45 minutes, or until sausage is brown. Serve hot. Makes 4 servings.

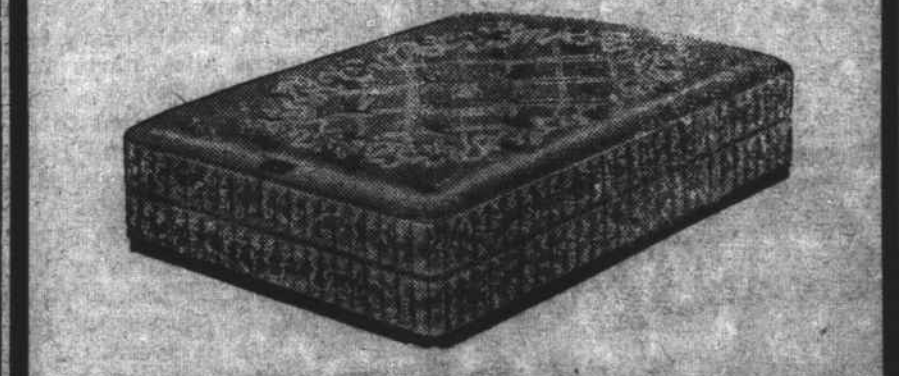
