

Bread With Zipper Is Out This Week

The Bakers of Aunt Sally's Southern Bread are presenting home makers of this section Twin Pack, a bread-packaging development perfected in the South before the war and attracting nationwide attention at the time according to Joseph Hexter, president of the Statesville Bakery.

The package, he emphasized yesterday, is a product of Southern bakery research and engineering. Twin-Pack further represents, Hexter believes, the most practical advance in bakery merchandising since sliced loaves were introduced to America's dinner table.

Primarily Twin-Pack consists of a colorful outer yellow and blue waxed wrapper enclosing two separately wrapped half-loaves of bread. One of the half-loaves may be served while the other remains wrapped and fresh for later use. A handy zipper in the center of the outer wrapper permits finger tip opening and adds a novel and practicable aspect to the bread package.

It was just before the war, Hexter declared, when Twin-Pack was first launched throughout Dixie. Paper and machinery shortages, however, necessitated abandoning further merchandising and development for the du-

ration. Coast to Coast Syndication Almost 50 of the country's leading bakeries from New England to California have already ordered machinery incident to merchandising Twin-Pack. It is therefore a source of pride that the package idea and its consequent improvement emanated from the South, Hexter said.

In 1939, engineers at the Baking Company's Atlanta plant had succeeded in perfecting Twin-Pack machines. Constant experimenting finally produced an ingenious system of wrapping equipment and conveyors capable of preparing 40 to 60 loaves per minute for delivery to waiting trucks.

Pre-Tested Sales in South Shortly after Twin-Pack's pre-war introduction in North and South Carolina, Georgia and Florida, consumer acceptance tests were made in Jacksonville, Macon, Greenville and Atlanta. Enough preference was established, according to surveys conducted by the Ross Federal Research Corporation, New York, to warrant further Twin-Pack expansion throughout the country.

It has only been during recent months that governmental emergency restrictions have relaxed sufficiently to bring the Twin-Pack bread merchandising idea back on grocer's shelves once again.

In line with the interest accorded Twin-Pack in its initial stages, merchandising state that the Southern idea received unusual recognition from Modern Packaging, a trade magazine. In 1941 that publication bestowed its "All American" first prize in the bakery classification to Southern Twin-Pack — during that year's competition which attracted more than 20,000 entries.
