## Bare, Crow, Reins, Two Local Teachers Swofford, Foster **For Commissioners**

Nominated For Board **Education Members** 

T. Scott Kenerly, well known North Wilkesboro citizen for many years, won the nomination for mayor of North Wilkesboro in the city's bipartisan primary Monday.

Rolling up one of the largest votes in a municipal primary, a most spirited contest was decided in each of the three officesmayor, commissioners and members of the board of education.

Polling 499 votes to 380 for Attorney W. H. McElwee, 60 for Harry Kerley and six for R. T. Broughton And and became the nominee for mayor, which is tantamount to election on May 6.
