History Mother's At Wake Forest Day Dates Back Over 1,000 Years

Sunday, May 11, will be Mother's Day.

Mother's Day officially is only 33 years old in America, but in Mexico it is a custom which dates back 1.000 years.

The Nahuan Mexican Indians celebrated it with a flower fesdess, Chicomehuatl. In this counproclaimed Mother's Day on May 8, 1914. He asked that the secaside as Mother's Day and that government officials and private citizens observe it by hanging flags on public buildings and inhomes as a national expression of love and reverence for the mothers of this country.

The custom of honoring Mother, however, is not new. Even in ancient times mothers on certain dates were honored with valuable gifts, according to the Jewelry Industry Council.
