No Definite Amount Set In Motion To Make Necessary Appropriation

The board of commissioners, composed of M. F. Absher, chairman, C. C. Sidden and I. J. Broyhill in May meeting voted unani-Instead of July 1st mously to reopen and operate the institution, which was closed in the early war years because of the lack of a substantial number of patients and shortage of trained help.

Because of the rise in number of tuberculosis cases in the county who have not been able to obtain accomodations in the state hospitals for tuberculosis, a committee representing several civic organizations here urgently requested that the county institution be re-opened.

No definite amount was appropriated for operation of the institution during the coming year, that matter being deferred until the budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1 is made up and adopted.
