Mr. Van Namee spoke of a poor safety record as a "Hog in he House" and defined an accident as a production interruption which is not only harmful to the health and welfare of the employee, but is also a very important item in increasing production costs. He offered as a olution to this problem an adequate training program within he plant which follows the emloyee from the date of his employment until he finishes his period of orientation on the job. Various ways and means of seeping all employees informed egarding the safety program were also mentioned, the most utstanding of which are handwoks, properly prepared and ed, and cartoons' or posters which in some instances may be worth thousands of words. He oncluded his most interesting and instructive address by saying that accidents do not hap-

pen and can be definitely traced to causes which can be prevented by good training and proper upervision. W. A. Early, superintendent of
