Stock Car Races Sunday, July 27

Championship stock car auto racing, which has boomed into northwestern North Carolina's greatest sports event, returns to the North Wilkesboro Speedway here next Sunday when Promoter Bill France presents 110 laps of racing.

The complete program will be the longest ever staged in the two Carolinas. Included in addition to time trials are three 15-lap heats, a 25-lap consolation and a 40-lap main event. Time trials will begin at noon and the first race will get under way at 3 p. m.

The cream of the nation's gas jockeys will make their bids for fame and glory on the five-eighths of a mile dirt track here. Already entered are Fonty Flock, Ed Samples, Bob Flock, Glen Dunnaway, Buddy Shuman, Johnnie Rogers, Lee Morgan, Del Patch, Jimmy Lewellyn, Billy Carden, Olin Allen and Lewis Hawkins. The total field is expected to number between 30 and 35 cars.

Stock car racing here has attracted crowds twice the size of the entire population of North Wilkesboro in the past, and Sunday's show is expected to run along the same lines. In the space of two short months, Wilkes county has boomed into North Carolina's racing capital solely because of the lightning fast speedway here.

To insure a dustproof track, over 10 tons of calcium chloride and salt will be dumped on the speedway. The races will also be sanctioned by the National Championship Stock Car Racing Circuit, America's foremost racing organization.

Said director Bill France last night:

"North Wilkesboro has upheld the faith we had in the town when we first introduced stock car racing here. Hundreds of people told us we were making a big mistake in staging races this far from a major city, but I think the results have proved we did the right thing. We have had nothing but the best possible cooperation from residents and merchants of this area—for that reason we plan to continue bringing the best in racing to the local speedway."
