Welfare Board Meeting Is Held; **Report Is Given**

The Wilkes County Welfare Board met in regular session in the Welfare Office in the courthouse on Tuesday evening, September 2, 1947, at 7:00 p. m. All three members of the Board, composed of P. J. Brame, chairman, F. C. Johnson, and C. C. Sidden were present. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The Secretary, Mr. Charles C. McNeill, advised the Board that "We were now within a few dollars of our monthly allotment on both OAA and ADC. The Board was also advised that we had approximately 60 pending OAA applications and 30 ADC applications. The Board expressed some concern over the possibility of not having sufficient money to give assistance to the new applints that might be approved fring the next several months. The Board was advised that our monthly allotment would probably be sufficient to take care of the new cases and revisions which would be passed on by the Board at this meeting." The Secretary discussed with

the Board the expenditures of the Department for the month of August. This report indicated a total expenditure for all purposes of \$19,516.18. A breakdown of these figures indicated that 771 received OAA in the amount of \$11,974, with an average grant of \$15.53 monthly. 208 families received ADC in the amount of \$5,698.00, making an average monthly payment per family of \$27.95. 37 received aid to e Blind in the amount of

\$997.00, giving an average monthly grant of \$26.95. Other expenditures including medical care, hospitalization, boarding home care, and general assist ance totaled \$847.18.

The remainder of the meeting was devoted to hearing reports from the case workers, Mrs. Inez Bowles, Mrs. Vera Casey, Miss Corinne Faw, Miss Clara Ogilvie, and the Superintendent, who presented a number of cases for approval, revision, and termina-
