Dave Hall Harvests 180 Bushels Corn From Acre of Land

Dave Hall, proprietor of Mer-rymont Farm in the Yadkin valley near Wilkesboro, produced 180 bushels of corn on one acre this year.

Mr. Hall has just barvested his highest producing acre, which was planted to yellow hybrid N. C. 26,

On a two-acre test plot at an other place on Mr. Hall's farm 300 bushels of that variety were harvested. The two-acre plot was grown under supervision of the Extension Service and the goal was 400 bushels, but flood waters during the summer partially covered the growing corn and the flood damage was estimated to have cut the yield at least 25

L. Vyne, Widely Known Citizen

Died Wednesday Morning After Two Weeks Illness; Funeral Friday

Leonard Vyne, 73, for several decades a prominent northwestern North Carolina business leader and one of Wilkes county's best known citizens, died at 10:30 Wednesday morning in a hospital in Statesville, where he had been a patient for two weeks. Mr. Vyne was born April 4,

1874, at Zealand, Ottawa county, Michigan, a son of the late Garrett and Joanna Vyne. He received his business education at Grand Rapids, Michigan, and came to Wilkes County in his

Mr. Vyne in his early years in Wilkes resided in Wilkesboro and he and his father operated a lumber manufacturing business. For many years Mr. Vene was

retired from active participation in business, except for real estate and personal business.

Noted for his ability in financial matters, Mr. Vyne was elected chairman of the Wilkes county board of commissioners and served with distinction in that capacity. He was also the leader in the good roads movement in Wilkes in the early days of highway construction and became so endeared to the people that he was presented with a shriner diamond pin which was purchased by the people of Wilkes with no one contributing more than


