Many Now Losing Monthly Benefits Of Social Security

There are persons in this area who are losing money every day, according to the Salisbury office of the Social Security Administration, because they have not made application for Old-Age and Survivors Insurance payments.

Many local residents eligible to receive Old-Age and Survivors Insurance benefits who have already made an application for these payments, failed to receive all that they should have because they did not apply at the earliest possible time. The way the Social Security law works, eligible persons must apply for these payments or no payments are made.

Social Security payments are made to working people over 65 who have retired from covered employment and to widows, children, parents, and other relatives of working people who have died. Sometimes the payments are monthly, and sometime a lump-sum payment is made. But in every case, the payments must be applied for before they can be received.

"We are here to serve the people and to see that they are paid," Louis H. Clement, manager of the Salisbury office said in an interview today, "but we can't go to the people—they must come to us." Commenting further, Mr. Clement said: "Every workingman over 65 who has quit working should immediately get in touch with our office. And the family of every working man who has died should write or come in to the office at once."

NAVY EDUCATION UNITS LOCATED IN 7 OVERSEAS USAFI BRANCHES

Navy education service units have been established in seven overseas branches of the United States Armed Forces Institute to speed up the service and better accommodate a more than doubled percentage of Naval personnel participating in off-duty classroom and self-study courses during the last year.

The Navy units, each under an officer in charge, have been established at USAFI branches in Tokyo, Manila, Guam, Honolulu, Seattle (for Alaska), Balboa, and San Juan.

Currently, about 12 per cent of all Naval personnel participate in the educational program through organized classes aboard ships and stations, through self-study texts, through USAFI correspondence courses, or through correspondence courses offered by 59 cooperating colleges and universities.

The educational facilities of USAFI are the main component of the Navy's Educational Services Program, which aims at enabling all personnel to further their education at all levels in vocational, technical and academic fields. The branch offices facilitate the program by spreading the administrative workload and reducing an otherwise unavoidable time lag in mail dealings with USAFI headquarters at Madison, Wisconsin.

Prior to assuming duties at branch offices, Naval officers, so assigned are given indoctrination in testing methods, counseling techniques, and general education procedures.

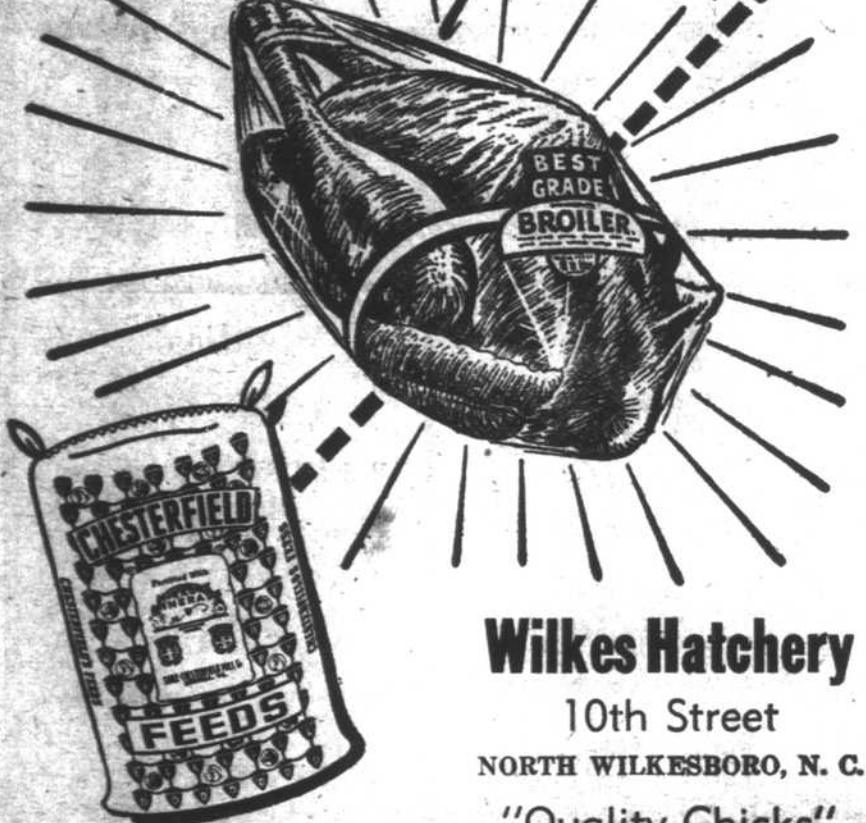

IT'S WAFFLE TIME



This is the season that family or guests really go for waffles... ideal for Sunday morning breakfast, or for a light supper after a mid-day Sunday dinner.

Mix your batter ahead of time and store in the refrigerator, but leave out egg whites and baking powder until just before baking. Then dissolve baking powder in a little water and mix into batter. Last of all, add the beaten egg whites, folded in.

Always have your batter cold. Mixing ahead of time insures cold batter, but then waffles impromptu are fun, too. In that case, stir in a few ice cubes, but of course decrease milk in proportion.

If you're having company, a waffle iron at each end of the table speeds up supply. (Festive, too!)
