Basement Window: Safe Chiseled Open

Safe crackers made away with about \$200 in cash Thursday night at Midway Pontiae company, located between the Wilkesboros.

Wilkes Sheriff C. G. Poindexter said that one or more thieves entered the building by breaking through a basement window. The medium sized safe was burst open with hammers and chisels, he said.

Agent of the State Bureau of Investigation were called in to continue the investigation.

Sheriff Poindexter described the robbery as being very similar to a safe cracking robbery at Gaddy Motor company here several weeks ago, when an office safe was chiseled open and more than \$500 in cash was taken.
