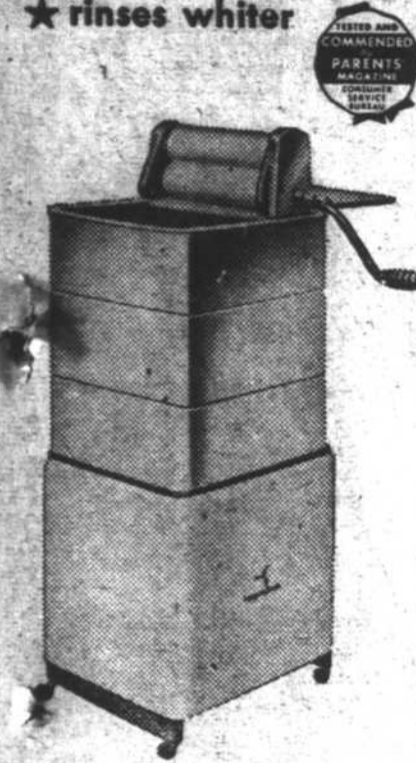


Sheep Men Will Meet at Boone
