Dr. C. M. Walters Killed In a Crash

Greensboro. — Three automobile accidents occurring in the Greensboro-Burlington area since Monday night had claimed the lives of three persons and left three others hospitalized last night.

The dead were Dr. C. M. Walters of Burlington and Alvie Gullett and Howard M. Davis, both of Route 1, Linwood.

Dr. Walters died at 7 p. m. in St. Leo's Hospital here after his car collided with a truck at the intersection of Highways 220 and 62 at Level Cross about 11 miles south of Greensboro late yesterday afternoon, according to state highway patrol reports. Hospital attaches said he sustained a fractured skull and severe lacerations about the face and neck.
Mrs. Walters remained in St. Leo's suffering from head injuries and shock, attendants said.
