Coffee Wreath

A treat — with coffee and Carnation!

3/4 cup Carnation Milk, scalded
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 qt. household yeast
1 egg
1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/2 teaspoon mace
1/2 cups sifted flour
2 tablespoons melted butter
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup raisins
1/2 cup nuts, chopped

Combine Carnation Milk, water, shortening, sugar, salt. Cool to lukewarm; add yeast. Let stand 5 min. Blend in egg, lemon rind and vanilla. Gradually add mace and flour combined, and mix until dough is well blended and soft. Roll dough on floured board to 1/4-inch thickness. Spread with melted butter, brown sugar, raisins, nuts. Roll like jelly roll. Form into ring on greased baking sheet. Cut first diagonally with scissors at 2-inch intervals (almost to center); turn petals slightly. Let rise until doubled in bulk (about 1 hr.). Bake in moderate oven (350°-375° F.) about 30 min. Frost while warm with confectioner's icing. Makes 1 large or 2 small rings.
