Committee Will Serve Veterans On Employment

Connelly C. Gamble, assistant state service officer, William Mcley, field reprsentative, VRRD, United States Department of Labor. Certificates of appointment have been issued to these committeemen and they are now prepared to aid veterans in obtaining reemployment and seniority rights to which they are entitled under the selective Service Act.

These Committeemen will all serve voluntarily in giving advice and assistance to veterans who feel that they have reemployment problems involving restoration in their old jobs or seniority and accrued benefits on the job and to those who have been laid off or discharged without cause before completing one year of employment to which they are

"Every effort will be made to adjust all cases amicably," Mr. Bradley said. "This is in keeping with the policy declared by Secof the Department's Veterans wise. It is believed, however, that such cases will be rare."
