Asking Bids On Improvements At City School Here

Will Rebuild Stairway And Construct Wash Rooms In Elementary Bldg.

Plans have been drawn and bids are being asked for alterations and improvements at the North Wilkesboro elementary school building.

Plans call for remodeling both ends of the building and construction of concrete and steel stairways, one at each end. The remaining space by elimination of one stairway will be used for the construction of wash rooms, two on each of the three floors. These improvements will lessen fire hazards in the three-floor building, because the stairways will be fireproof, and the wash rooms are highly essential in the interest of better conditions for the large number of students housed in the building. Bids for construction will be received until four p. m. April 4 in the office of J. Floyd Woodward, North Wilkesboro school superintendent.

U, V, W, X, Y, Z January 1 through June 30, 1951.
