Dr. Sylvester Green Sees Hope For Troubled World

"Blending education, religion, and character will produce an answer for tomorrow's needs," Dr. C. Sylvester Green, editor of the Durham Morning Herald told the local Kiwanis Club at its luncheon meeting here Friday.

The visiting editor was speaking on the topic "Tools of Tomorrow" and declared that "in spite of the seriousness of the current international situation the nation's one best hope is in the preservation of those ideals that have made it great.

"Potential enemies may be ruthless in their first attack but in their reasoned analysis of America they must know that basic principles of truth and justice produce ultimate victory for those who practice them, and defeat for those who attack
