Mrs. N. O. Smoak Entertains Her Club

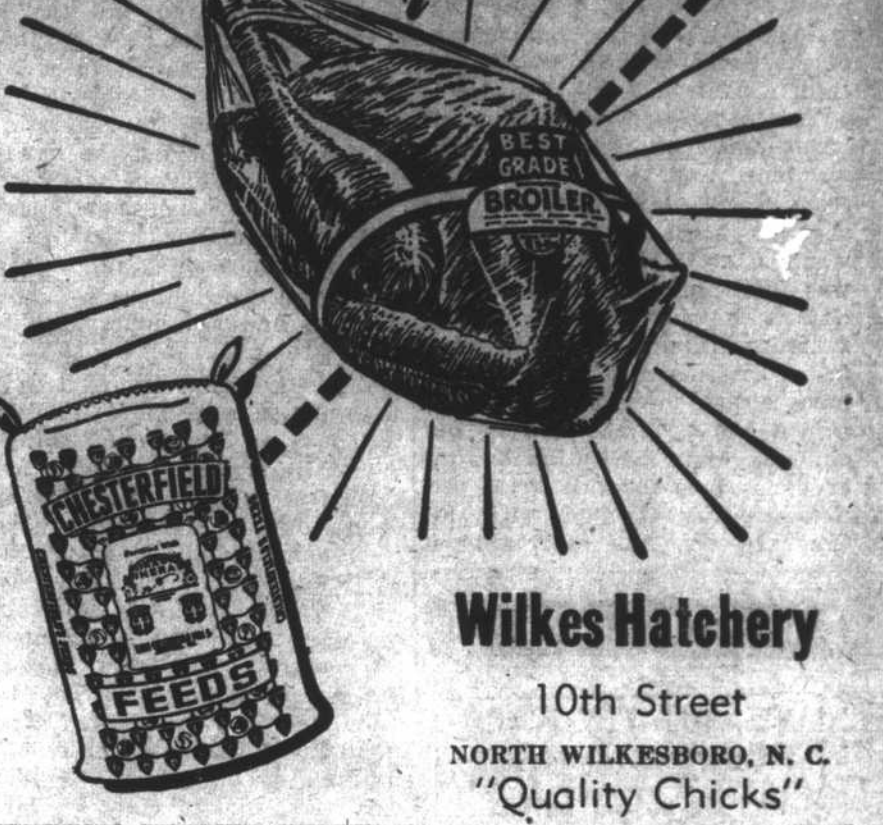
