Lenoir Rhyne Student Fined

Statesville, April 26 .- In Federal court here this afternoon Broadus Caudle, 22-year-old Lenoir Rhyne college student, tendered a plea of nolo contendere to an extortion charge, was ordered to pay a \$500 fine, and was placed on probation and good behavior for two years.

J. E. Broyhill, Lenoir capitalist, to whom Caudle wrote an extortion note demanding \$1,000, was not here to prosecute, as he is reported as saying he did not believe the boy meant to do any

In giving the young defendant a year and a day in Federal prison, suspended on probation and good behavior for two years and on payment of a fine of \$500, Judge E. Y. Webb suggested that the boy sell his automobile to pay the fine and other debts. The court expressed the belief that Caudle intended to do no violence when he wrote the note to Mr. Broyhill. There was a general feeling among court officials that the defendant should continue his course in school.
