

At a meeting of the board of of Commerce, which was attendit was pointed out that the inauguration of highway postoffice service from Greensboro to Johnson City, Tenn., would greatly improve mail service.

Thomas R. Lehman, of Winston-Salem, president of the third division of the Railway Mail Association, and Tom Cheek, of Greensboro, vice president of the Railway Mail 'Association, explained to the meeting how a highway postoffice could step up mail service in northwestern North Carolina and east Tennessee by 24 hours.

At the present time a star route brings mail from Greensboro and Winston-Salem early in the morning and returns in the afternoon but does not carry parcel post or registered mail. Consequently, parcel post or registered matter mailed in North Wilkesboro after one p. m. does not leave the North Wilkesboro postoffice until the next afternoon. The incoming mail service pointed out.
