HUGE STILL DESTROYED BY FEDERAL OFFICERS



Here is a view of a moonshine still destroyed last week in the White Plains community near Roaring River by Federal Alcohol Tax Unit investigators. Officers lescribed the outfit as one of the largest ever located in this area. The still was a 200-gallon pot type still, and as the picture shows there was an eight horse power sawmill boiler to generate steam. Included in materials destroyed were 3,500 gallons of wheat and sugar mash, a sufficient amount to make 350 gallons of liquor, which could have been turned out in one day by the huge outfit. 
