Six Cases Polio In Wilkes But Not Classed as Epidemic Here Now

On Monday night, July 12, the regular monthly meeting of the Wilkes-Alleghany Counties Medical Society was held at the home of Dr. James C. Mills. The meeting was well attended.

Among the subjects discussed was the present infantile paralysis situation in Wilkes county. The doctors sincerely feel that there is no epidemic in this county and no cause for serious alarm. It was realized, of course, that there is some polio present but it was felt that not every child that had a little fever and was a little upset was necessarily a case of that disease. The exact means of transmission of this disease is not known. There have been two modes, however, that have been pretty well established.
