Millers Creek Man Charged With Poisoning His Wife February 22

Preliminary hearing for Leoncharged with poisoning his wife, has been set for Friday, 2:00 p. m., before Justice of the Peace Six Polio Cases

Miller has been in jail several weeks after he was charged with causing the death of his wife February 22 at their Millers Creek home. He has claimed innocence throughout.

The body of Mrs. Miller was aken from Pleasant Home Baptist church cemetery over three months after burial and report of an autopsy stated that her stomach "contained more than enough strychnine to cause instant death."

Miller is alleged to have handed her what he said was a headache powder. She died in a few minutes after taking the pow-

Ten Western North Carolina counties were represented in the treated at North Carolina Baptist Hospital Monday. Wilkes County with six and Yadkin with 5 cases, were leading.

Surry and Davidson County had four cases each, and Iredell County three patients. Others are Stokes County with two patients and Montgomery, Gaston, Rockingham and Forsyth with one patient each.

Many other counties have also been represented in the census kept on polio cases since the beginning of the 1948 outbreak, but the number changes daily with admissions and patients being dismissed to their homes or transferred to convalescent centers. The Baptist Hospital has only

one patient from Forsyth County due to the fact that City Memorial Hospital restricts its services to patients from Winston-Salem and Forsyth County, so local patients are admitted there, leaving Baptist Hospital facilities available to citizens of other the service. counties. One Winston-Salem patient was transferred from the sons and daughters: Miss Nettie Baptist to the City Hospital last week. The only one at the Baptist Hospital now is twenty-yearold Betty Conrad of Forsyth County, who has been in an iron lung at the Baptist Hospital since

last March. The entire second floor of the Baptist Hospital's pediatric wing has been converted into a polio ward, and eight additional nurses, including one physical therapist, have been secured for the hospital by the Red Cross through auspices of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralys-
