On the civil rights issue, Senator Cain said that the Republicans favored the policy of each state solving its own problems as far as possible and that the Democratic party is no longer the great organization with states' rights a fundamental principle. He described Govern- or Thurmond as a "top notch joe" whom he learned to respect while a colonel at the front in Belgium.

In conclusion, he held up Dewey and Warren as a great team which will bring unity in America and make America so strong that no aggressor will bring on war.
