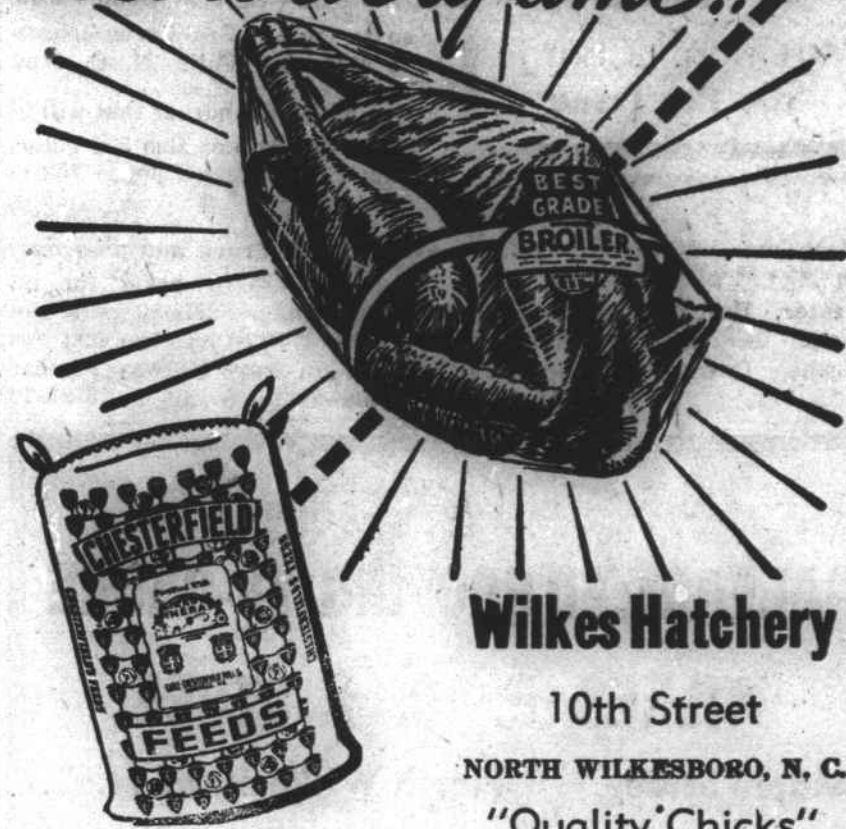
The bridal note was predominant for decorations in the ball room and mezzanine floor, while mixed autumn blossoms were used in the lobby.

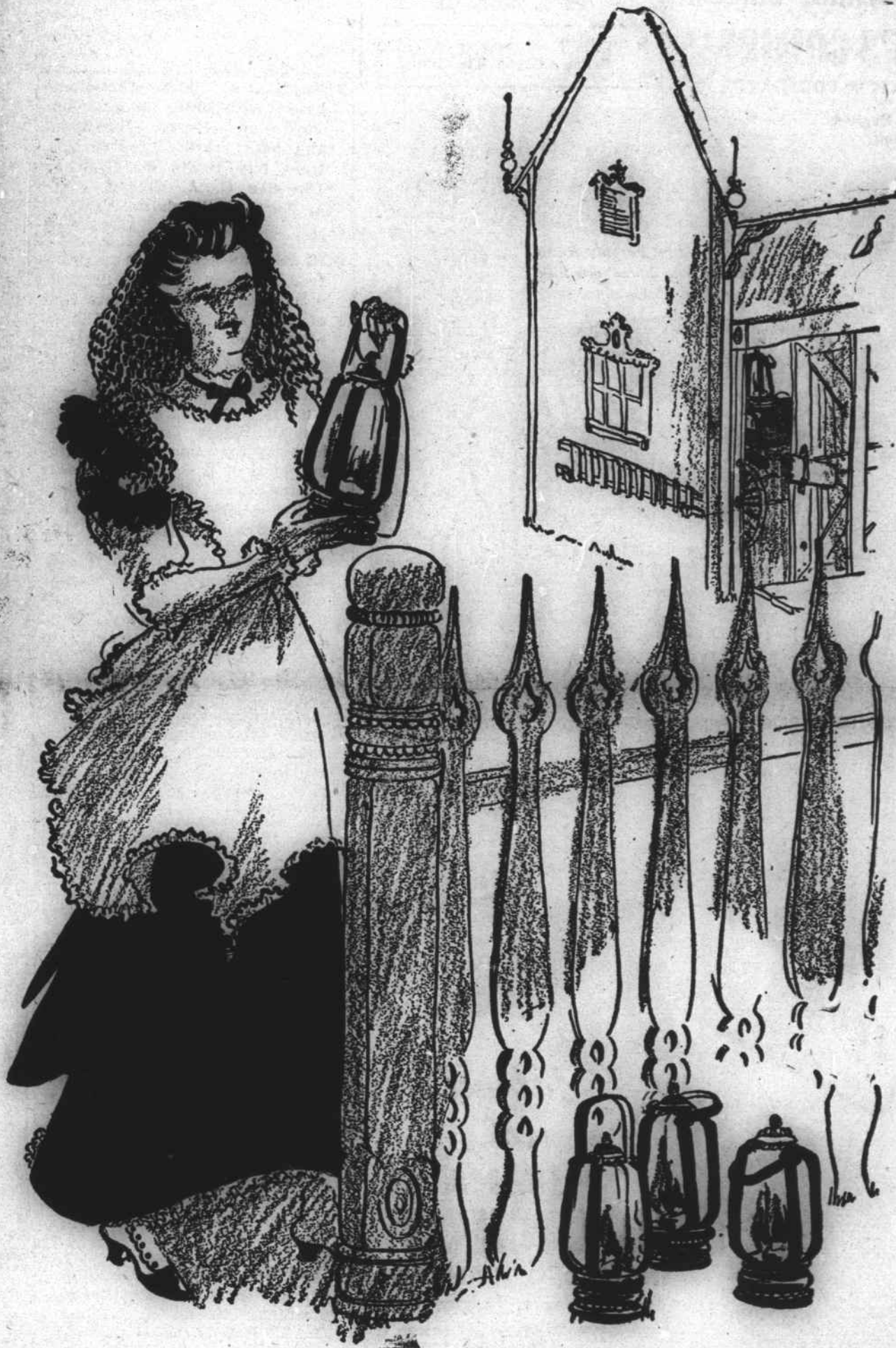
