Most everyone who has had experience with children knows that it is not an easy matter to be a good parent, but "when our children are most difficult and most unloveable they are most in need of our understanding, our love, and our guidance." We must therefore, let them feel that we trust them and have confidence in them by giving them freedom of doing things on their own. Suggest things they

should or should not do, but try to develop in them a feeling of confidence and responsibility for their own actions. "Happy is the child whose mother remembers being a child."

Mrs. Bumgarner pointed out that it takes time to be a good parent. "Anything that is worth while takes time, so take time to live with your 'teen-agers instead of for them."

The meeting was dismissed with prayer, led by Mrs. J. P. Crysel.

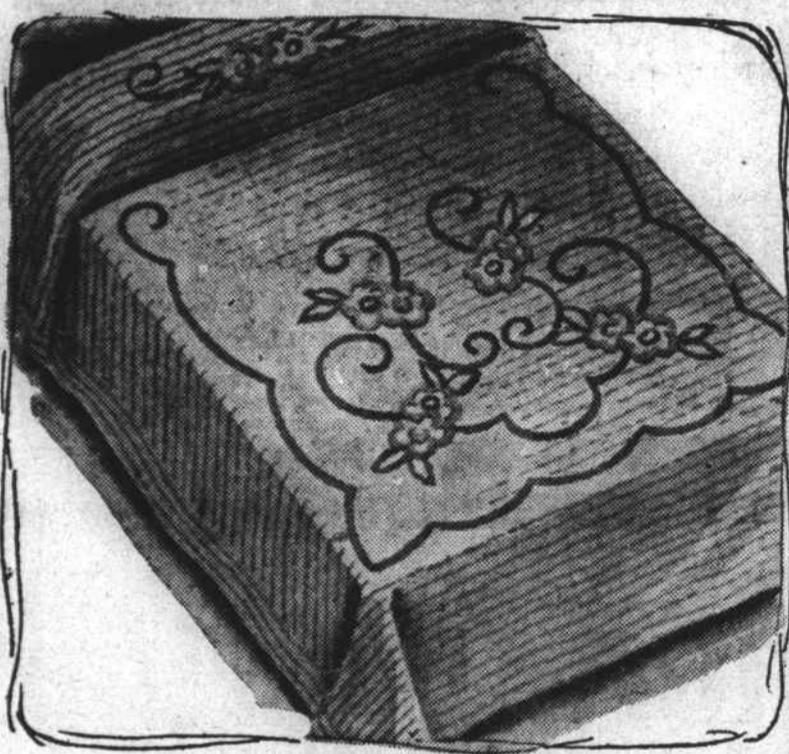

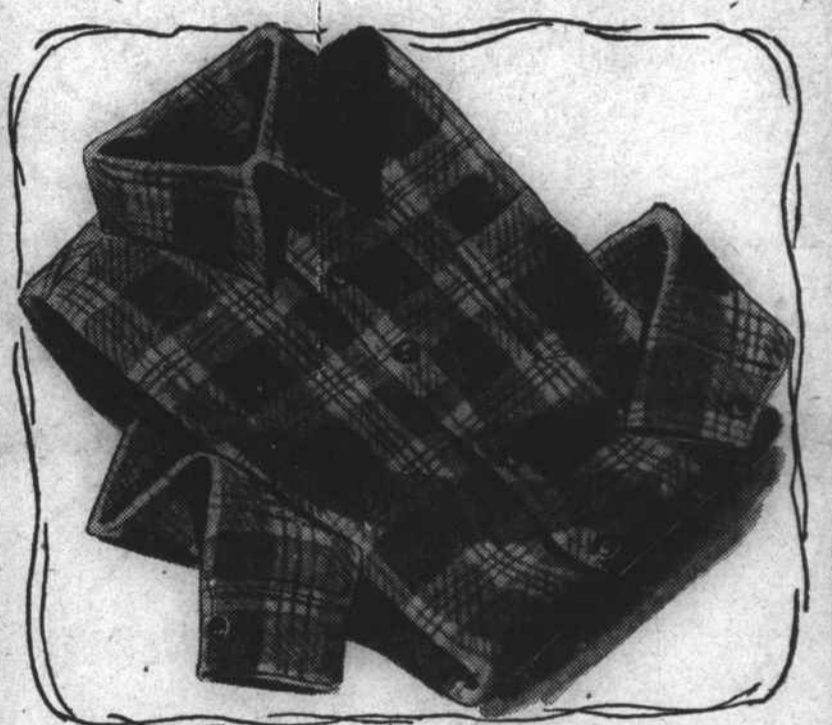
