Claus. A chorus of more than 60 voices joined in singing Christmas carols around a lighted tree in Memorial Park, while thousands sat in the bleachers and stood about the athletic field waiting for the arrival of Santa.

The crowd was even larger than anticipated and larger than could be accomodated.

Memorial Park was jammed with people and before time for the program to open traffic in the vicinity of Memorial Park was stalemated. All parking space was taken about the park and cars lined the highways and streets for several blocks, extending all the way to up-town
