Oliver Franklin Richardson, born July 2, 1871, departed this life January 20, 1949. He was the son of the late M. F. and Louisa Blevins Richardson. He was 77 years of age.

Funeral was held Saturday, January 23, at 2 p. m. at Round Hill Church, with Rev. L. E. Sparks and Rev. Troy Blevins in charge of the service.

He was first married to Rosa Pruitt Feb. 20, 1895. To this union were born six children. Two died in infancy. Survivors are C. E. Richardson, Greensboro; Mrs. Roy Alexander, Roaring River; Mrs. Ray Lankford, North Wilkesboro Route 1; and Mrs. B. C. Jordan, Lomax. His first wife preceded him in death March 1, 1919.

His second marriage was to Clara Warren Feb. 8, 1922. To this union was born one child. He died an infant. His second wife preceded him in death May 13, 1940.

He professed a hope in Christ in the year of 1894, joined Round Hill church and was a faithful member until death. He was ordained a deacon some 40 years ago. He was an excellent Sunday school teacher and a leader for the choir at Round Hill and

Stony Ridge churches for years. He was very devoted to this work and wanted to see the cause of Christ advance.
