With more than \$11,000 already in, there is a very definite possibility that Wilkes may reach its minimum goal of \$12,000 in the infantile paralysis campaign If additional gifts are received this week, Sam Ogilvie, campaign chairman, stated today.

The increase during the past week was due mainly to a splendid job on the part of North Wilkesboro school, which set a new record for schools by raising \$651.08, Chairman Ogilvie said. With a number of special events and dime cards solicitation, the student council carried out the campai,n which followed up previous efforts by other groups in the city and was in the form of a mop-up campaign. The students worked diligently and conducted a most thorough campaign, Mr. Ogilvie said.

The campaign chairman today made a plea for those who have neglected to give to get their contributions in, so that the quota can be reached. He stated that since December 1 that bills for treatment of Wilkes patients still in hospitals have accumulated to the amount of \$11,200. During the year more than \$25,000 was spent for treatment of the 42 patients during the 1948 epidemic.

Killed Today On Power Line Pole

Contact With Line Carrying 6,900 Volts Instantly Fatal To Young Man

Cecil Tyre Calhoun, 20, electrical lineman, was electrocuted four miles east of this city this morning while working on a pole on the line along highway 268.

Wilkes Coroner I. M. Myers termed the death an accident, saying that the young man evidently had come in contact with the line carrying 6,900 volts. He was alone at the time of the ac-

Young Calhoun was working for Floyd S. Pike Construction company, of Mount Airy, currently engaged in contract work for the Duke Power company branch at North Wilkesboro. Foreman on the job on which Mr. Calhoun was working stated that he carried the young man to a pole and instructed him to remain there until he went to Queen Trucking company nearby to call to North Wilkesboro and inform the office that the line along highway 268 east of that point was to be disconnected for a short time.

It was Mr. Calhoun's task to climb the pole and throw the line switch. While the foreman was at Queen Trucking company to make his call, a motorist stopped and told the foreman that the lineman had been electrocuted and that he had found his body at the pole.
