A. had dreamed about a playground, finally in 1942 5.2 acres of land was purchased from Mr. Roby Bishop to enlarge the playground to what it now is.

Something over \$2,-000.00 is now in this fund. By March 18 1947 a 100 foot well drilled by R. E. Faw and Sons had been completed, and a modern water system installed. Two typewriters were purchased. It was announced that year that the school had been made a four year high school. A large refrigerator was purchased for the lunch room that year.


