County Officials Score Communists

Blowing Rock, June 27.—At its annual convention held last week at Blowing Rock the State Association of County Commissioners adopted resolutions involving communism and federal jurisdiction over privately-owned forest land.

The Communist resolution emphasized that American freedom was intended only for loyal citizens and not for those who would destroy this freedom. It stated that Communist activities were subversive and therefore any known Communist school teachers should be removed by the trustees of the state schools.

The forestry resolution objected to a Senate bill which would give the secretary of agriculture jurisdiction over privately owned forest land, and urged that a hearing be arranged before the Committee on Agriculture and Forestry in an effort to defeat the bill in committee before it reaches Congress.

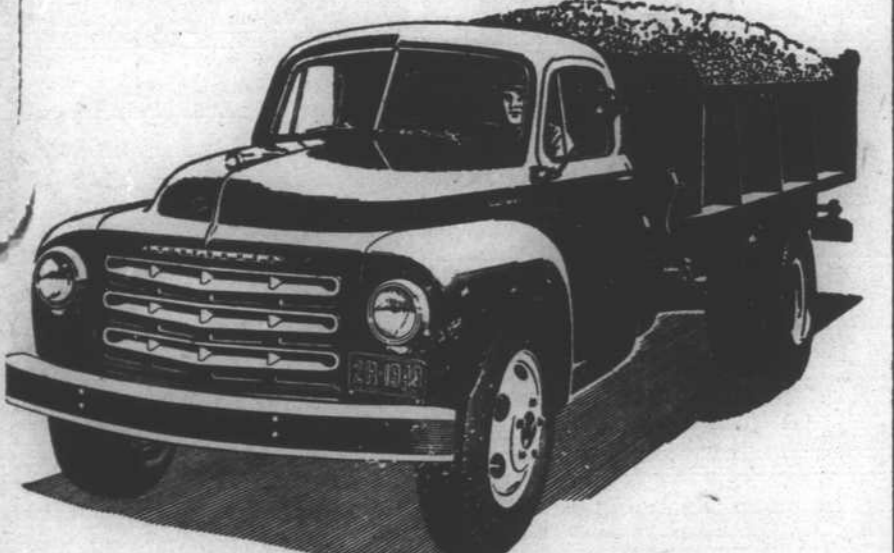
