cans—all feel that country is greater than party." This statement was made today by Louis H. Clement, manager of the Social Security Administration field office in Salisbury, N. C.

Mr. Clement further stated that another outstanding landmark in our history exemplifying this American spirit of co-operation in critical times is the passage of the Social Security Act in August 1935, which grew out of changes that took place in our way of life. Our late President Roosevelt in his message to Congress on June 8, 1934 described these changes thusly: "Security was attained in the earlier days through the interdependence of members of families upon each other and of the families within a small community and of organized industry make less real these simple means of security. Therefore, we are compelled to employ the active interest of the Nation as a whole through government in order to encourage a greater measure of welfare and happiness and does not indicate a change in values. It is rather a return to values lost in the course of our economic development and expansion."

Mr. Clement explained that the Social Security Act is a foundation on which we have begun to build this security against risks which very few can meet alone and Old-Age and Survivors Insurance does provide some measure of protection to people who work on jobs that are now covered by this program. The Social Security Administration, as required by law, makes recommendations to the Congress for improving and broadening the several provisions of the act. The chief recommendation for the past several years has been to extend the protection to all gainfully employed persons and to increase this protection against loss of income from old age and death. Summaries of these recommendations are available, upon request, at the local Social Security Administration Field Office, Mr. Clement said. The local office is at 301 Post Office Building, Salisbury, N. C.

Canned peaches, apricots, and mixed fruits, especially fruit cocktail, are on the July list, along with fresh plums. California's plum crop this year probably will be the second largest in history, and shipments should reach some Southern markets.

The weekly average price received for broilers by North Carolina producers at the four Central North Carolina markets climbed to 26 cents per pound for the week ending June 11. This was one cent per pound above the average prices paid for the three preceding weeks.

Wide Selection Foods Available

July shoppers will find a wide selection of foods on the U. S. Department of Agriculture's plentiful foods list for Southern markets, says Mrs. Annie H. Green, home demonstration agent for the State College Extension Service.

Producers are culling inefficient hens from laying flocks and sending many heavy birds to market, in addition to already plentiful supplies of broilers and fryers. The 1949 production of broilers and fryers is the greatest in history.

Commercial fish landings are usually heavy in July, and markets should offer buyers a choice of either fresh or frozen fish. Cottage cheese is a newcomer to the plentiful list, the home agent said. The fat content of

cottage cheese is low, which makes it low in calories in relation to other nutrients and, therefore, well suited for people looking for a nourishing food that is not fattening.

Dried beans and peas, peanut butter, and eggs also are reported plentiful, while the vegetable trio for the month will be cabbage, canned corn, and Irish potatoes. More sweet corn was packed in 1948 than in any previous year. Markets already had a near-record carryover from the previous season and, as a result, retail supplies are considerably larger than usual.

Good quality honey supplies

are plentiful, Mrs. Green said, though the best buys are in the large containers—5 to 60 and cans.
