Johnston County Votes Bone Dry

Smithfield.—Johnston yesterday became the 34th of North Carolina's 100 counties to go bone dry when voters decided by a majority approaching 2-1 to discontinue legal sale of beer and wine. Sale of liquor had not been legal in the county.

The complete, unofficial vote total in the special referendum was reported as:

Against beer 3,734, for 2,161.
Against wine 3,817, for 2,048.

Beer and wine elections are scheduled in six other counties: Ashe, Clay, Lee, Moore, Sampson and Wayne.
