

Maternal Welfare →Broadcasts Every Tuesday WKBC

Under auspices of the Maternal Welfare Committee of the North Carolina Medical Society and the Wilkes Medical Society, broadcasts are given each Tuesday, 10:45 a. m., over radio station WKBC in North Wilkesboro. The first in the series was given on Tuesday of last week and was heard with much interest, especially by women listeners.

According to the State Medical Society, 40 per cent of the maternal deaths in the state are result of ignorance and neglect on part of patients and their ramilies in seeking medical care.

The aid of the broadcasts is

to educate the public in proper procedures and to reduce the maternal death toll. "Postnatal Care," which means care after delivery, will be the subject for September 27. On October 4 the subject will be "Obstetrical Hemorrhage" and the subject or the final program in the seemia Pregnancy."
