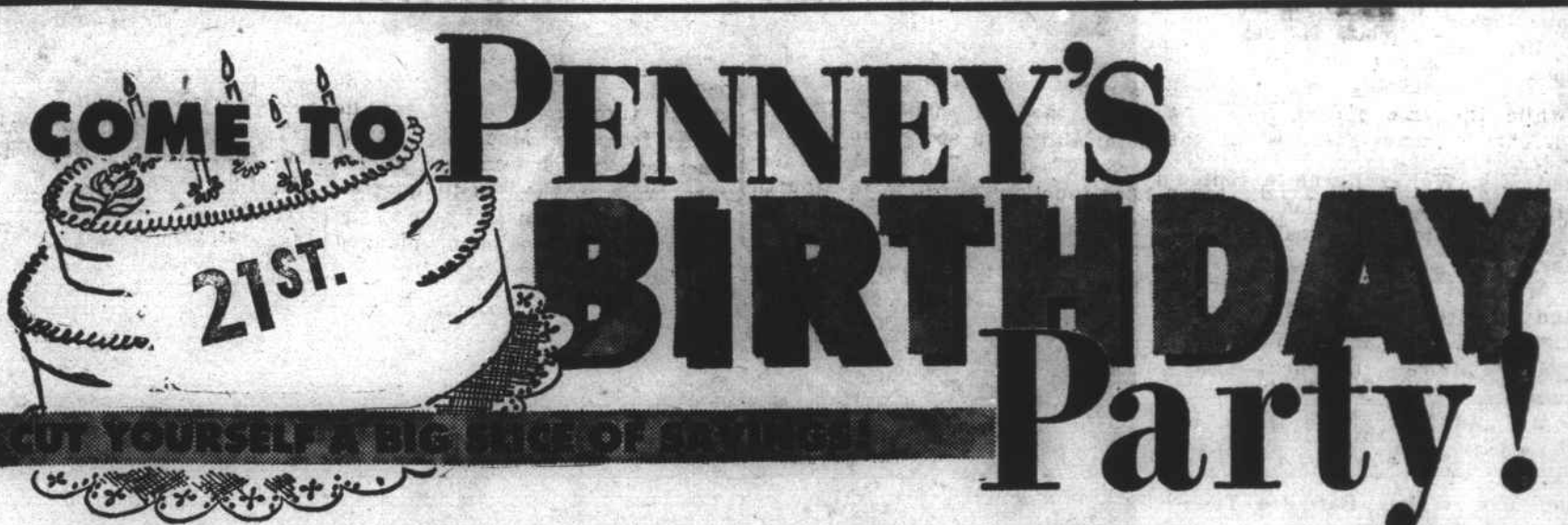
### Social Calendar

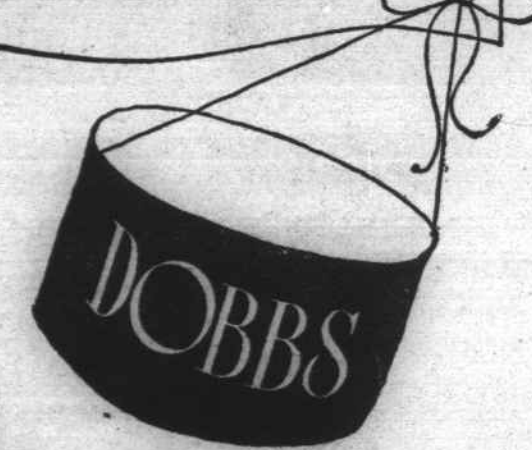
