Mrs. C. E. Nickols, a 24-yearold divorcee, and Kenneth Fleet Conklin, 45, an unemployed bartender, were found shot to death Saturday in Mrs. Nichols' apartment.

Judy Mae told police Conklin shot her mother and killed himself after an argument.

"They both fell down and went to sleep," she said.

The shooting left Judy Mae homeless. She is being cared for by relatives, pending the finding of a permanent home.

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
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
