Mother's Murder Orphans Girl, 5

Kansas City.—An uncertain future today faced blonde five-year-old Judy Mae Nichols who witnessed the fatal shooting of her mother.

Mrs. C. E. Nichols, a 24-year-old divorcee, and Kenneth Fleet Conklin, 45, an unemployed bartender, were found shot to death Saturday in Mrs. Nichols' apartment.

Judy Mae told police Conklin shot her mother and killed himself after an argument.

"They both fell down and went to sleep," she said.

The shooting left Judy Mae homeless. She is being cared for by relatives, pending the finding of a permanent home.

The girl said that after the

shooting she went to sleep in her bedroom. Her sobs the next morning attracted a maid who found the bodies.

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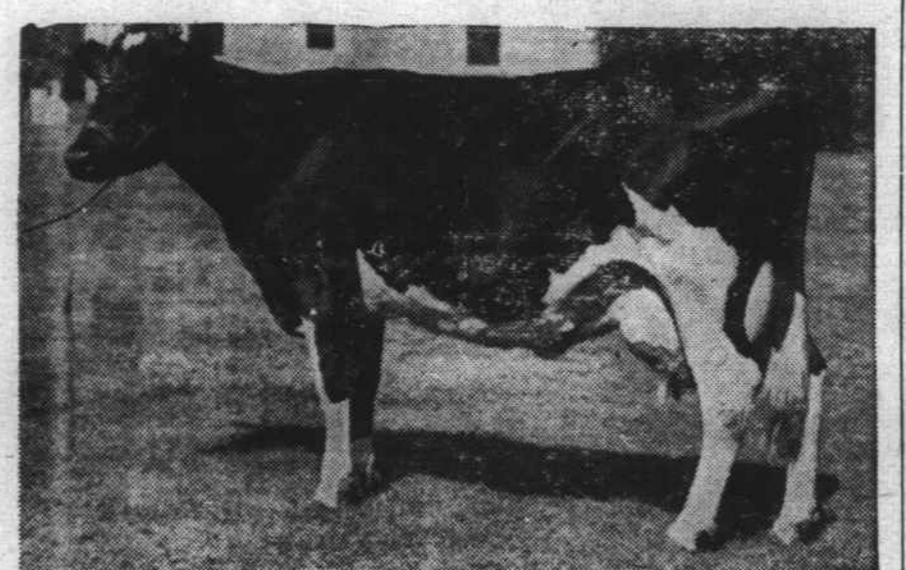
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Miss Jane Jones Honors Mrs. Irwin
