Senator Says Coffee Drinkers Will be Gouged 650 Million

Washington.-Senator Guy M. drinking public has been or will be gouged for \$650,000,000 by recent "manipulation" of tne coffee market.

The survey was made at the 1935-39. request of Gillette's Senate agriculture subcommittee, which has been investigating zooming coffee prices and the "spread" of prices generally between what the farmer receives and the consumer pays.

Gillette said the survey showed there has been "definite manipulation" of the market. But. he said, the most "astonishing fact in the survey was the disclosure that more than 100,000,-000 pounds of coffee "disappeared" in this country between Oct.


