Question of the legality of North Wilkesboro mayor's court is headed for the North Carolina Supreme Court as an outgrowth of the Grace Hayes Wingler case, it was learned here today

Mrs. Wingler was convicted in city court here on charges of operating a disorderly house where prostitution was practiced. She was sentenced by Mayor R. T. McNiel to two years in jail. Her case was heard before Mayor McNiel without a jury. She gave notice of appeal and was at liberty under bond pending trial in the superior court.
