#### Local News Reporter ATU Agents Blast 400-Gallon Stil

One of the largest illicit distillery outfits ever located in northwestern North Carolina was blasted to oblivion Friday agents of the Wilkesboro office of the Alcohol Tax unit.

The still, found in Antioch township, had a capacity of 400 gallons and total mash capacity of 7,000 gallons. Mash destroyed totaled 6,500 gallons and represented a big investment, principally in sugar, a member of the raiding party said.

ATU agents making the raid used dynamite to blast and destroy the huge outfit. The still had been in operation
