**West Point, Navy Examinations Soon**

Senator Graham today announced that, in accordance with his policy of seeking to secure by open competition the best qualified North Carolinian for entrance to the military and naval academies, the United States Civil Service Commission will on July 17, 1950, conduct a competitive examination for young men seeking appointments to West Point and Annapolis from North Carolina. Standing on this examination, together with other qualifications of physical fitness, character and leadership will be the basis for his selection for the appointments to the two academies which becomes available July 1, 1950.

Participants in the examination must have reached their 16th birthday on or before July 1, 1950, and be less than 21 years of age on July 1, 1950. The examination is given by the Commission at any First or Second Class Post Office most convenient to the applicant.

In order that arrangements may be made for conducting this examination, it is necessary that all persons desiring to take this examination notify Senator Frank P. Graham, Senate Office Building, Washington, D. C., not later than July 7, 1950. Applicants will then be notified where to appear for the examination on July 17th.

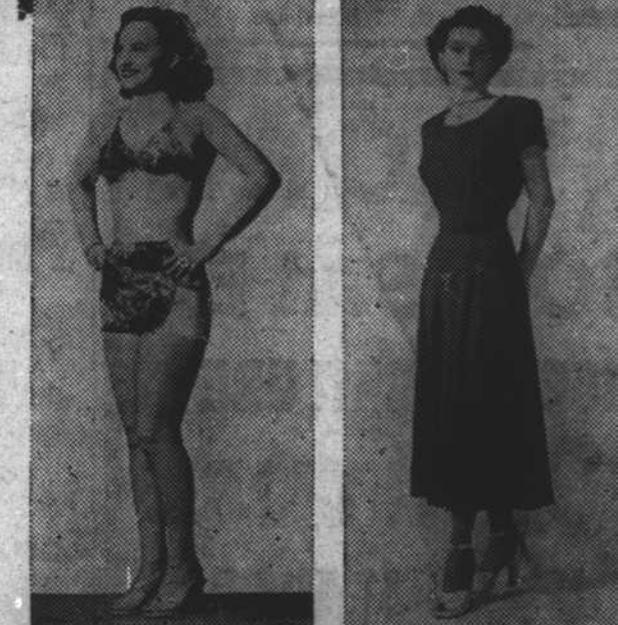
