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RIGHTS AND DUTIES OF THE STATES. At the request of the States of Virginia and North Carolina, the following resolutions were adopted by the Convention of the States of the United States, held at the City of Philadelphia, on the 29th of September, 1787. The Convention, after a long and anxious deliberation, and after having taken into consideration the various resolutions and reports of the Committee on the subject of the Union, and after having heard the arguments of the several States, do hereby declare that the said States, in order to secure the best and most permanent Union, and to secure to the people the greatest amount of Liberty, Justice, and Safety, have agreed to unite themselves into one people, under the name and title of the United States of America, and to form a more perfect Union, to establish Justice, to insure domestic Tranquillity, to provide for the common Defence, to promote the general Welfare, and to secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do hereby ordain, declare, and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.
