We well know that the Simon Pure party when in power, practice very liberal construction of governmental powers, but we did not know, until so informed by Judge Fillis, that "the present appropriations for the Western Extension would be sufficient to omplete the Road to the Tennessee line, and leave a balance of \$600,000." We cannot procure it, but our recollection of it, as well as that of others whom we have consulted, is that the cost would be some six or eight millone of dollars. The cost of boring that hole, we think, was estimated at four millions, or urwards. Has our Democratic Legislature stade any such appropriation as this? The next day the Mayor ordered out Gen. Tracy's division of milisia, and a collision between the authorities and the municipal forces seemed inevitable. The authorities took pomession of the First District Armory also. But the Vigilance Committee having seized upon all the ammunition in the armory, the authorities had to refrain from an attac't until they could make a supply of ball cartirdges. These were soon made, however, and the Mayor proceeded to the headquarters of the Vigilance coveries yet made none seem to answer the purpose so Committee and read the riot act.
