Tivoli itself, which is 18 miles from Rome, is anxious to overthrow the Papal government. There remain to the Pope the provinces of Rome, Civita Vicchia, Frosinone and Velletri, and the two latter will shortly be occupied by Sardin-There is a great outcry at Rome against M. de Merode, because he still thinks of resisting in the provinces of Velletri and Forsinone, despite the june 2-pd6m. defeat of Lamoriciere's army. He has obtained a rescript from the Holy Father, by which all the gendarmes are placed at the disposal of the Min-\$3 ister of War, and he immediately ordered a portion of them to Velletri.
