WARRENTON, Mo., Dec. 24, 1861.—The damage to the North Missouri Railroad may be summed up as follows: Bridges at Surgeon, Centuria, Mexico, Jefferson, and Warrenton, burned; also one station and perhaps twenty cars.

WARRENTON, Mo., Dec. 24.—By arrivals from Mexico we learn that the bridge over Salt river, which is the largest and most costly on the road, except that at Ferguson, which the rebels previously spread on Friday night, was entirely destroyed.
