WARLIKE INVENTIONS-A ROTARY FORT. There is in the Navy Department here the model of a floating fort, of a very peculiar descrip-tion, the invention of Major Robt. Gamble, a citizen, we believe, of South Carolina. The combination of its parts develops at once its locomotion and projectile powers. It is claimed for the inven-tion that, though a construction of light draft that might easily be adapted to the waters on the coast of Carolina, Georgia and Florida, (and thus made a collateral means of harbour and sea coast defence,) it is capable of carrying guns of the heaviest metal, and accommodating easily a garrison of three hundred men. The peculiar of this fort, which distingushes it from the floating batteries at present in use, is, that when in action, it revolves on its centre, thus bringing each gun in rapid succession to bear upon the enemy. The invention has not yet been tested by actual experiment on the part of the Depart-ment; but if it fulfills its ingenious design, there can be no doubt of its adoption by the Government. The preliminary report of a board of officers upon it has, we believe, been favourable .-

The effect, however, of the tides upon its locomotion seems to be problematical.—Richmond Ex-A CHARMED LIFE. The N. O. Delta relates the subjouned incidents in the life of General Wm. H. T. Walker, of Georgia, late a Colonel in the U.S. Army, who is now in command of a brigade of Louisianians in the

Confederate service:

Gen. Walker is not only respected among military men for his abilities and courage, but is noted for escaping death upon two occasions, where escape was hardly anything short of a miracle.— In one of the battles, in Florida, he was literally riddled with rifle balls. The surgeons told him riddled with rifle balls. The surgeons told him to prepare for death, frankly informed him that his case was hopeless. He told them that they knew nothing about it, that he intended to recover, and he did recover. Again at Molino del Rey, then a captain, in leading his men to take a redoubt, as he approached it, in advance, he looked round to see how his men were behaving. He saw every one of them, but two or three, hors du combat, and fell on the spot himself pierced by so nany balls that it would be a severe tax upon credulity to enumerate his wounds. Again the surgeons told him he must die and again he told them be would see them d—d first." Three or four months after, he left the City of Mexico a ghastly spectacle, and was conveyed to Vera Cruz on a litter, unable to bear any other mode of conveyance. He reached home alive, however, recovered and survivos all his desperate wounds, a vigorous denial of medical prescience.

THE VIETUES OF BORAX.—The washer-women of Holland and Belgium, so proverbially clean, and who get up their linen so beautifully white, use refined borax as washing powder, instead of sods, in the proportion of a large handful of borax powder to about ten gallons of boiling water; they cave in soap nearly half. All the large washing establishments adopt the same mode. For laces cambrics, etc., an extra quantity of the powder is used, and for crinolines, (required to be made used, and for crinolines, (required to be made stiff,) a strong solution is necessary. Borax being a neutral salt, does not in the slightest degree injure the texture of the linen; its effect is to soften the hardest water, and therefore it should be kept on every toilet table. To the taste it is rather sweet, is used for cleaning the hair, is an excellent destrifice, and in hot countries is used in combination with intraric acid and bicarbonate of soda as a cooling beverage. Good tea cannot be made with hard water; all water may be made soft by adding a teaspoonful of borax powder to an ordinary sized kettle of water, in which it should boil. The saving in the quantity of tea used will be at least one-fifth.
