HE IS VERY MUCH ALARMED AT HIS The following letter from Colonel Cogswell, now in prison in Richmond we copy from a Northern journal. Poor fellow, it seems that he is in great trepidation about the probable part his neck will bear in the great drama of (his) life, and thinks it is very hard that it should be made responsible for the late maurauding expeditions of its bearer. Our readers will find it a rich document, and we

herefore give it entire: RIGHMOND PRISONS, Nov. 11, 1861. Dear Brother :- I write to you under very painful circumstances. In case the privateersmen are punished, the authorities have concluded to to retaliste, and they have selected the highest in rank to operate on. My letter to S- will ex plain all to you. To-night or to-morrow, I, with the remainder on the black list, will be confined continued indications of increasing confidence, inspire in the county jail, and treated as criminals awaitme with the hope that I shall be more liberally patron- ing trial, and the action of the authorities here will be governed by the action of the Government

in reference to the privateers. Console dear S—as much as possible under the circumstances, and do not let her come to Richmond in any event whatever. In this pending calamity I feel much more for my wife and my child than myself. I believe that the majoriity of the officers on the list are married men, with wives and children as dear to them as my S -- and the "Lttle Lady" are to me. * When the name of Captain Ricketts was

drawn, Capt. Thomas Cox, of the First Kentucky regiment, offered to take his place; but this of course was not allowed. It was a noble act. God bless him for it. I never supposed that honestly and faithfully serving my country would bring my neck in danger of a halter; but so it appears. I never thought that, after being spared the half storm of balls at

Leesburg, I might have to face death in another and dishonorable form. Tell J. T. B. that I expect him to do his best, as I do not wish to be hung for piracy on the high seas, when I never ventured on the briny deep

without being sea-sick. Please write to me as soon as you receive this, and state how this new act in the programme is received in the North. What do the people say about the exchange of prisoners? The Government must now exchange or carry the war to extermination. They can take no middle course. S- has the list of officers. Please have it published in the city papers, as we do not wish to go down un-Heralded. I shall send a copy of the order of Benjamin to J. T. B. You can examine it at your leisure, as it is one of the important pa-

pers connected with the war. Give my love to D- and the children, and believe me as still your friend and brother. M. COGSWELL. Thad. H. Lane, Esq., New York.

A YOUNG HERO.

Just before the war broke out, and before Lincoln's proclamation was issued, a young Virginian, named Summerfield, was visiting in the city of New York, where he made the acquaintance of two Misses Holmes, from Waterbury, Vermont. He became somewhat intimate with the young ladies, and the intercourse seemed to be mutually agreeable. The proclamation was issued, and the whole North thrown into a blaze of excitement. Upon visiting the ladies one evening, and at the hour of parting, they remarked to Summerfield that their present meeting would probably be the last; they must hurry home to aid in making up the overcos s and clothing for the volunteers from their town. Summerfield expressed his regret that they must leave, but at he same time especially requested them to see that the overcoats were well made, as it was his intention, if he ever met the Vermont regiment in battle, to kill one of them and take his coat. The fight was over, and Summerfield had time to examine his prize, when, remarkable as it may appear, the coat was marked in the lining with the name of Thomas Holmes, and in the pockets were found letters signed with the name of the sister, whom Summerfield had known in New York, and to whom he had made the remark we have quoted, in which the dead man was addressed as brother. The evidence was conclusive, he had killed the brother of his friend, and the remark which he had made in jest had a melancholy fulfillment. We are assured this narrative is literally true. Summerfield now wears the coat, and our informant states is not a little impressed with the singularity of the coincidence.
