

THE LONDON TIMES ON THE MASON-SLIDELL SEIZURE

If requires a strong effort of self-restraint to discuss with coolness the inteligence we publish to-day. An English mail steamer sailing under the British flag and carrying letters and passengers from a Spanish port to England, has been stopped on the high seas and overhauled. The legal course would have been to take the ship itself into purt, and to ask for her condemnation, or for the condemnation of the passengers, in a Court of Admiralty. The result might, no doubt, have been the same; but if the proceeding was irregular we have surely a right to demand that these prisoners shall be restored.
