The fact that, if France or any other Power should demand the concurrence of England in disavowing the inefficient blockade of the Southern ports by the federal fleet, it would be difficult to find a logical plea for refusal, is apparently the main consideration that induces the public to look cautiously at future contingencies. The evidence seems complete that, if the present nominal blockads is to be respected, the provision of the Treaty of Paris that a blockade shall not be recognized unless it be real must be looked upon as cancelled, and an impression prevails that this result would be distasteful to all statesmen who recognise the claims of commerce and civilization.

> The meeting of the French Chambers on the 16th inst., and of the English Parliament on the 6th of February, may be followed by some important declaration on the subject. The initiative is thought likely to be taken by France, since the effects of the cotton dearth are more se vere upon that country than upon Great Britain, where a great compensation is found in the im-pulse given to India. At the same time it is seen that this country can have little inducement to forego joining in an imperative entorcement of legal principles, as the popular and almost universal cry in the federal States seems now to be that every advantage which can be gained. whether from success at home or from the forbearance of foreign nations, is to be hailed as a means of hastening the time when the Trent affair can be "avenged." Baylor, of Jefferson, went to the Ferry with a view of capturing a truitor by the name of George Rohr, who has been acting in the capacity of ferryman between the Virginia and Maryland shores and who had rendered himself particularly odious by giving information of the movements of our forces in that neighborhood. Captain Baylor succeeded in having Rohr enticed to the Virginia side of the river; but finding it impossible to capture him, he shot him in the boat. This exasperated the Yankees to such an extent that they came over, under the cover of night, and fired the town. The result was as stated above, the destruction of a considerable portion of the Town. We learn that Rohr died soon after he was shot.

NAPOLEON PROPOSES TO EXCHANGE THE MEXICAN THRONE WITH AUS-TRIA FOR VENICE.

The Bærsenhalle, of Hamburg, publishes the tollowing extract from a letter from Venice: It is confidently stated that the project of the accession of the Archduke Maximillian to the throne of Mexico was made the subject of confidential communication between the Ministers of the Government of Austria and the French Government. If we are well informed, the Cabinet of Vienna has recently charged Prince Metturnich to give such an answer to the French propositions, without absolutely declining them, as nay leave doubt that the Austrian Government will never entertain the idea of making any acquisitions in Mexico a ground for negotiating a transfer of Venice.

A NEW WAR VESSEL .- The Charleston Courier calls the attention of the authorities intrusted with the duty of procuring a Steam Ram, for which an appropriation of \$300,000, was made by the South Carolina State Convention at Its late sees on, to the model and plan of war a vessel recently designed by one of our native mechanics. The plan has been examined by the Navy Department at Richmond, by whom it is admitted to "embrace features which are regarded as new and eminently useful."

Among the advantages presented by this plan, are those of swiftness to overtake a fleeing enemy and the ability to crush the op osing vessel in a part most susceptible of damage and incapable by of repair. At the same time this war vessel will be so constructed as to expose but a very small surface to the shot of the enemy, and even that surface, small as it is, can be at pleasure safely reduced by depressing the vessel still further in the water.
