"IN HIS BLANKET ON THE GROUND."

Weary, weary lies the soldier In his blanket on the ground, With no sweet "Good night" to cheer And no tender voice's sound Making music in the darkness, Making light his toilsome hours, Like a sunbeam in the forest, Or a tomb wreathed o'er with flowers.
